“AHH KNEE TAH”

No, it is not from the Klingon language on Star Trek)

I would like to explain to those, who at one time or another, may have overheard how I traditionally greeted Anita and why.

Understandably there may even be some folks out there under the impression I have a severe speech impediment or other cognitive difficulty (the later may be up for grabs after this contribution) but I can assure you that was never the intent.

The Onstar communication system in my pickup is a hands free voice activated satellite telephone service. There is no alpha/numeric keypad or rotary dial so everything must be clearly spoken and pronounced for the voice activated software to recognize, program, and execute the auto dial.

Once connected to the service a female computer voice prompts the caller for the purpose of the call. I say “STORE” and the voice asks for the number. I slowly, and clearly state the numbers and after confirming the information is correct the voice asks for the “NAME TAG”. If any mistakes are made during this process I must start over. Sometimes the computer gets the numbers wrong, REPEAT. Sometimes the name is not understood REPEAT, or a background noise interrupts the recording... REPEAT. Often the NAME TAG is too similar to another STORED NAME TAG --- REPEAT.

Such was the problem when I tried to store “Anita Home” and her other number, “Anita Cell” --- they sounded too similar to the computer.

I repeatedly tried to pronounce the second word of the NAME TAG differently to distinguish it from the first but it was rejected every time and I was required to try again.

*Out of desperation to get the second number successfully stored I, for unknown reasons other than panic, quickly stated in a fairly loud, very deep, slow monotone voice with exaggerated pronunciation....
“AHH KNEE TAH”*

The calm mechanical female voice accepted the offering and played back the recording asking if it sounded OK. Repeatedly I responded YES but was also simultaneously laughing and “THE VOICE” could not understand the response.

Finally my impromptu recording was accepted and from that time forward if I wanted to call Anita’s cell phone I would have to say (in that peculiar voice) “AHH KNEE TAH” to be recognized and the number dialed.

I told Leanne and her Mother about the NAME TAG listing and they thought it humorous also so it became my regular greeting to her Mom --- both on the telephone and in person. Even when meeting out in public for lunch or something, others within earshot might have heard the unusual vocalization.

Although I knew Anita for only about six years I was never-the-less blessed with an abundance of wonderful memories - many involving her beautiful voice and extensive repertoire of songs. She was a devout Christian and dearly loved her family and friends.

Anita demonstrated dignity, strength and faith during the many months preceding her earthly release. She was/is an inspiration to anyone fortunate enough to know her.

No matter how you pronounce it, Anita or “AHH KNEE TAH”, she will be greatly missed here but there is little doubt Heaven’s choir got just a little bit better last Sunday.

Rejoice in the good memories.
